
Graduation Requirements

The state of Michigan requires all students pass:


- 1. Biology

- 3. a third year (of their choosing)


9th Grade Science Courses

- Most students take Biology
- Students will be selected for HONORS Biology (approximately 60 students based on teacher recommendations, standardized test scores, math level, reading scores)
- Some students test into MST program

9th Grade HONORS Biology

- intended for students who plan to pursue upper-level science courses or a science related career
- course extends beyond the Michigan Science Standards
- level of breadth (more topics) is greater
- level of depth is greater as well
- more independent work is expected such as projects and presentations
- students receive a 0.25 GPA bump







Science

- Science is an integral part of a well-rounded education.
 - The study of science helps build critical thinking and problem-solving skills that are essential in today's ever-changing and advancing society.
 - Students must complete three years of science to meet high school graduation requirements but are encouraged to take as many science courses as possible.
 - Students planning on science related careers are encouraged to complete at least four years of Honors or AP science courses.

English 9

- Challenges students to explain and apply their reading, writing, speaking, and listening abilities.
- Students will read and/or write about a variety of literary genres including: short stories, poetry, myths, novels, and nonfiction.
- Writing focuses on MLA format, citation of sources, and using C-E-R (claim, evidence, reasoning) to develop body paragraphs

English 9

- Students will study a variety of literacies where they are asked to consider author's purpose, main ideas, and supporting details
 - Novels
 - Nonfiction
 - Digital literacy/online texts
- Students will draft pieces in a variety of writing styles where they are asked to consider their audience
 - Informational
 - Argumentative
 - Literary Analysis

English 9 Units

Each unit contains:

- > An essential question
 - What defines us more: nature or technology?
- An anchor text that models the style of writing students will do throughout the unit
- A mid-unit writing task
- A speaking and listening task
- > An end-of-unit writing piece

English 9 Units

> Semester 1:

- Survival
 - Anchor text: Suzanne Collins' The Hunger Games
 - Writing focus: Argumentative Essay
- Journeys of Transformation
 - Anchor text: Homer's The Odyssey
 - Writing focus: Explanatory Essay
 - Greek Mythology presentation

English 9 Units

- > Semester 2:
 - The Things We Make
 - Anchor text: Ray Bradbury's Fahrenheit 451
 - Writing focus: Synthesis Essay
 - Crazy, Stupid Love
 - Anchor text: Shakespeare's The Tragedy of Romeo and Juliet
 - Writing focus: Literary Analysis Essay

English 9 Honors Course


- ➤ A challenging, accelerated course for students who have a solid work ethic and exceptional reading and writing skills.
- More rigorous than English 9, with more reading and writing
- > Factors considered for placement:
 - NWEA test scores from the spring of 8th grade (which includes scores in language usage and reading skills)
 - M-Step test scores
 - Note: placement will not be based on previous Advanced Language Arts experience
- Summer reading is <u>MANDATORY</u>, and it is considered a classroom assignment.

English Electives for 9th graders

- > **Journalism**: an introduction course focusing on print journalism and photojournalism. Students will interview sources and write news, features, and editorial articles. Students will also study a podcast. Recommended for strong writers.
- ➤ 1 semester
 - Note: this course is available to 9-12 graders. It counts as an English credit for seniors only; for 9-11th graders, it counts as an elective credit

English Electives for 9th graders

- Acting: students study theater from the actor's point-of-view. Exercises in voice improvement, stage management, characterization, dialects, and stage combat will be completed. Serious and comic scenes and monologues will be prepared and presented.

U.S. History Scope and sequence

Here are some key components of U.S. History:

- Start with a unit on Native Americans/Industrialization and go up through present day.
- Urbanization, Progressivism, Imperialism, World War I, Roaring 20's, World War II, Great Depression and New Deal, Cold War, Civil Rights, Vietnam, America in the 80s and 90s
- Common tests/exams, DBQs, WebQuests, Kahoot, Blooket, essays, and projects

Honors v. Advanced Placement (AP) What is the difference?


- AP
 - Created by College Board,
 which also does SAT Testing
 - A national curriculum
 - Exams given in early May
 - Students may earn college credit for passing exam
 - AP grades are .5 GPAhigher than regular classes

Why take AP Human Geography?

- It is the only AP class offered to freshmen & is an early opportunity to be academically challenged.
- Possibility to earn college credit while still in high school, at a small fraction of the price
